Highlights

The Central Kalahari Game Reserve

The CKGR was established in 1961 by the British Government to protect the traditional way of life of the nomadic San Bushman tribes. The park covers an area of 52800 square kilometres and makes up an 11th of Botswana's total land area making it the second largest game reserve in the world, the first being the Selous Game Reserve in Tanzania covering 54 000 km2. The CKGR is a scrub desert with almost no surface water available.

Home to the famous "Kalahari Lions" the area has healthy populations of cheetah, brown hyena, gemsbok, springbok, giraffe, wildebeest, bat eared fox and the tenacious honey badger.

A landscape with endless horizons, the early evening air is dominated by the never ending calls of the Kalahari barking geckos.

Species that can be found in the Kalahari include oryx, the desert-adapted springbok, jackals, the rare brown hyena, red-crested Korhaan and herds of wildebeest.





Makgadikgadi Pans National Park

The Makgadikgadi zebra migration moves east away from the Boteti River into the huge open grasslands of the Makgadikgadi Pans after our first good rains. Our camp will be erected in the grasslands just north - west of the expansive Ntwetwe Pans or further north at Baines Baobabs or Nxai Pan.

The salt pans cover an area of over 16 000km2 in the Kalahari Basin and form the bed of the ancient Lake Makgadikgadi which evaporated millions of years ago.

Although Nxai Pan was once part of the great super lake, it is quite different to the Makgadikgadi Salt Pans as it boasts broad hectares of short sweet grasslands with occasional "islands" of trees. The rich grassland provides good grazing and attracts springbok, impala, gemsbok, giraffe, kudu, hartebeest, zebra, wildebeest, all followed by lions and hyena, as well as a wide array of birdlife. Baines Baobabs, a cluster of seven Baobab trees are located within the park. The Baobabs were painted by Thomas Baines when he passed through travelling with John Chapman in 1862.

Detailed Itinerary – Maun to Maun

Day 1 & 2 & 3: Serviced Camping in the Central Kalahari Game Reserve - CKGR

Your guide will meet you at Maun Airport at 9:00 AM to begin your unforgettable Kalahari adventure. From here, you'll depart in an open game drive vehicle, heading into the vast and remote Central Kalahari Game Reserve (CKGR).

Today's journey takes you to Deception Valley, where you'll spend the next three nights immersed in the wild beauty of the Kalahari. The drive takes approximately 5–6 hours, with a picnic lunch enjoyed en route. As you travel, the landscape gradually transforms—dense bush gives way to open pans and low grasslands, eventually revealing the sweeping valleys that define this ancient terrain.



Deception Valley and the surrounding areas, including Passarge Valley, Sundays Pans, and Letiahau, were once ancient riverbeds, now long extinct and carpeted in short, dry grasses. With the first rains, this arid land comes alive, the grass turning green and attracting herds of wildlife in search of nourishment.

To deepen your appreciation for this extraordinary ecosystem, we recommend *Cry of the Kalahari* by Mark and Delia Owens—an evocative account of life and research in this remarkable region.

Fierce, haunting, and unforgettable, the CKGR leaves a lasting impression. Long after your departure, you may find yourself longing to return to its raw, soulful beauty.



Day 4 & 5 & 6: Serviced Camping in the Makgadikgadi National Park

We pack and move camp east to the huge expansive grasslands of the Makgadikgadi Pans in search of the huge numbers of zebra (up to 25000 animals) that leave the Boteti river system and concentrate on the open grasslands in search of nutritious grasses to give birth to their young. Despite their numbers they can be elusive and we spend the next three nights in search of the herds and exploring this vast open landscape. A scenic flight by helicopter is included in the safari in search of the zebra migration.





Day 6: Safari Ends in Maun

After an early morning breakfast and final game drive, we bid farewell to our wonderful camp team and begin our journey back to Maun. You will arrive in Maun around midday, in time to connect with your outbound flight or continue with your onward travel arrangements.

A Typical Day on Safari

The safari day starts as the sun rises. Your wake-up call will be between 5am and 6am - a gentle "koko" (knock-knock in Setswana) at the entrance to your tent. A camp assistant will be on hand to fill your wash basin with steaming hot water, and freshly made tea and coffee will be served around the campfire.

Before the early morning game drive, a light breakfast will be offered. This will include tea, plunger coffee, juice, rusks, fruit, cereal, toast and jams – just enough to boost your energy without using up too much of the golden hours of early morning, which is one of the best times of the day to see animals. Later on, as the temperature rises, many of them will retreat to the shade before becoming active again in the late afternoon.



Having spent the morning exploring the surrounding wilderness in search of Botswana's hidden treasures, you will return to camp for lunch under a shady tree (if the elephants have not pushed them all over!). Lunch typically consists of salads, bread (freshly baked over the campfire), cold meats and pickles. Just as the animals retreat to escape the heat of midday, we recommend that you do too. This is your chance to catch up on your reading, write about your adventures in your journal, take a siesta – or all three!

Later in the afternoon you will head out into the wilderness once more as the animals begin to feed and drink again. As the sun dips below the horizon, marvel at the sheer splendour of an African sunset and toast the beauty of Nature. This is best done with the traditional sundowner choice: a G&T.

On your return to camp, enjoy a starlit hot shower and then gather around the warmth of the campfire to relive the day's events with your fellow adventurers. A three-course dinner accompanied by South African wines is served beneath the magical canopy of the African night sky. Listen carefully and you may hear lions roaring, hyaenas whooping – or smaller creatures rustling in the leaves nearby... We can confidently say that



Botswana beef is the best in the world – and our slow-cooked potjie is just as delicious. And that's before we even mention our mouth-watering desserts.



Retreating to the comfort of your tent after enjoying a nightcap around the campfire and fall asleep to the calls of the African wild. Good night and sleep tight!



When travelling between campsites from Deception Valley to Makgadikgadi Pans, we choose routes through wildlife areas wherever possible which means that each transfer is really an extended game drive. A picnic lunch will be served at a suitably scenic spot en-route.



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
